HOW WE REDUCE STATION RISKS

VERY HIGH

- Target and deliver quality Safe & Wellbeing visits to the most vulnerable in the community, focussing on making referrals to partners.
- Promote and develop FireStoppers internally, and within the community.
- Conduct joint fire investigations with Police to identify trends & prosecute offenders.

HIGH

- Complete business fire safety audits, familiarisation visits and where appropriate pursue enforcement. (Conducted by FS team)
- Gather new & reinspect existing operational risk information, develop and test incident plans through tactical exercises (TX) for high-risk buildings.
- Support national and local RTC and Water Safety campaigns and tactics using risk-based data and working partnerships.
- Annual station based and LRF multi-agency TX programme.

MEDIUM

- Maintain local risk information based on historic incidents within the station area and undertake familiarisation visits training and exercising to ensure operational competence.
- Develop wildfire incident plans and work with partners to reduce the risk.

LOW

- Maintain awareness of Animal rescue capabilities at Bishop Auckland station & RSPCA.
- Monitor secondary (nuisance) fires and act on spikes in incidents

For all service risks at CDDFRS, firefighters will provide effective emergency response by maintaining skills and competence through the relevant training.
